Nga Kuaha o te Atawhai – Doors of Mercy opening anew

Celebrating 166 years of Mercy in Aotearoa New Zealand



Sisters of Mercy and their companions are gathering in Auckland this weekend to mark the 166th anniversary of the arrival of the first Sisters of Mercy in Aotearoa on April 9, 1850. They were led on their eight-month voyage half-way around the world by Mother Cecilia Maher (pictured) who recalled later that it was a journey 'that no one would make, except for God.'

Within four decades, other Mercy foundations were established in Wellington, Hokitika (and later in Christchurch) and Dunedin. The pattern in each centre was the same: a long journey to a site unseen, with few resources beyond a deep faith in God and a willingness to serve the poor wherever they were found and whatever their need. The tradition the Sisters carried from Catherine McAuley, their foundress, was to open doors of Mercy in the best way they could, dividing what they had to share with those who had less.

In this Year of Mercy, we are being invited to draw inspiration from our founding Sisters throughout Aotearoa, working and praying that their example will endure in our willingness to open Mercy's doors in our day.
